Dear Parishioners, On behalf of Fr Noel and myself may I take this opportunity to wish you all a very blessed and holy Christmas and to assure you of our prayers – that God may bless each of you abundantly with the peace that the world cannot give. Welcome to the celebration of the Holy Mass on this great solemnity of the Nativity of Our Lord. I would like to extend a particularly warm welcome to those of you who might be returning to Mass for the first time in a long while. We have missed you and are truly delighted to have you

among us again. (Perhaps you might open your heart to praying to Our Lord about reconnecting with our parish and coming to Mass each Sunday. More than ever, we all need the silence and the graces of the Eucharist.) The celebration of the birth of God-Incarnate – the commemoration of the mystery of how God became one of us in Jesus Christ – is always an opportunity for us to reflect on what we live for. What is it that ultimately gives meaning to your/my life? How much time do we make to ponder and think about what are the greatest questions of life? Who is God? How do I know He exists? What does it really mean to love God and to love others? What is prayer and how do I do it? What do I believe happens when I die? Of course, these are big questions – the most important questions – and, yet, in the busyness of life, they are often the questions we neglect the most. This is terribly sad and we, as a parish community, have a responsibility to do all we can to help our society realise this. As I have said several times now, my vision for our parish in Gymea is that it become a place where “mercy and truth meet together” and are never pulled apart. St Catherine’s must be a place where no matter who you are, no matter what you may have done, no matter how far you may have fallen away – Christ and His Church will always embrace you. The Sacrament of confession will always be available every day. I know how lost I would be in life without Christ’s embrace in absolution. However, there is no genuine experience of mercy and forgiveness (no true peace) unless it is founded upon the truth of who we are and the truth of who we are destined to become. For too long, the truth of our faith – its intelligence, its beauty, and its genius – has been watered down. I am much looking forward, therefore, to continuing to build up our parish as a centre of intellectual/faith formation in 2023 and ask you to pray, commit, and to reach out to the community. Truth and mercy is what every heart yearns for and, thus, every heart yearns for the gift of Christ and the genius of the Catholic faith. So, don’t be afraid!! Merry Christmas! 2022 began in the same way we will shortly begin 2023 in our parish with a very special Midnight Holy Mass, which was preceded by an hour of prayer in front of the Blessed Sacrament. A praying parish is a growing parish and, so, a key part of our vision this year has been to help people to fall in love with prayer and to come to know the power of the Sacraments. Our Parish is blessed to offer Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament every day (except Mondays) and Confessions are also available before and after every Mass. In February, the popular monthly Men's Breakfasts and Formation commenced. The Parish also launched a new Sacramental Program which provides formation to both students and parents. Soon enough, Lent was upon us and we were fortunate to nourish our hearts and minds through a "Lenten Lecture Series" with talks from Bishop Umbers on the spiritual life, a talk from Monica Doumit on Women in the Church, as well as other talks from Paul Elarde, Fr Ronnie, and Fr Greg. In June/July, Fr Greg then offered the "Didasko Talks" on the topic of "silence", which were livestreamed from our parish to people across the Archdiocese. Certainly, a major highlight of the year was the Eucharistic Procession down Gynea Bay Road. What a witness that was!







TALKS: In addition to all the events displayed to the left, the parish will continue its mission to become a centre of formation by offering various talks/lectures/seminars throughout the year.

SOCIAL OUTREACH: The parish will continue to develop new and effective ways for us to live out the Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy. It is a core part of our Catholic identity to reach out and support those who are struggling, sick, and suffering. A few ideas have been floated that we hope will commence and come to fruition in the new year.

CHRISTMAS COLLECTION FOR THE POOR: The generosity of parishioners and the children of St Catherine Labouré School has been overwhelming. Our Church collection taken up the Weekend before last raised an incredible \$10,219. The School Fundraising Market Stall raised an excellent \$3,108. 46 Christmas Hampers were also donated and packed by the teachers and parents of the school children and delivered by the Gynea conference. Thank you everyone for your generosity. God bless! Frank Tierney (President of the Gynea Parish Conference).

HAVEN'T BEEN TO MASS IN A WHILE? HERE ARE EIGHT REASONS TO COMMIT TO WORSHIPPING GOD AT MASS EVERY SUNDAY.

1. The Command of God: The Third of the Ten Commandments given to Moses by God is, "*Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day*" (Exodus 20:8).

2. The Command of Christ: Why should we keep the Sabbath holy by going to Mass? The Mass was instituted at the Last Supper by Jesus before his Crucifixion. The Last Supper was the first Mass. *When the hour came, he [Jesus] took his place at the table with the apostles . . . Then he took the bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which will be given for you. Do this in memory of me"* (Luke 22:14,19). When we celebrate the Mass, we repeat the Last Supper, as Jesus commanded us to do. In doing this, we remember and represent his great act of love for us on the Cross – taking our sins upon himself so that we, if we follow his commandments, can live with him forever in heaven.

3. The Command of the Church. The Church teaches that we must fulfill the command of Jesus ("Do this in memory of me") by attending Sunday Mass (or the Vigil Mass the night before). *The Catechism of the Catholic Church* (1994, pp. 493-94) explains that Mass attendance on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is the first of the six Commandments of the Church.

4. The Church speaks with the authority of Jesus: Why should we obey these teachings of the Church? Where does the Church get its authority? From Jesus. In Matthew 16:18-19, Jesus made Peter the head of his Church – the first Pope. He gave Peter and the Church "the keys to the kingdom of heaven": *I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven. Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in*

heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven.

5. What we do at Mass. The Mass is first of all a **sacrifice** – the perfect sacrifice, created by Jesus. Through the priest we offer Jesus, Body and Blood, to the Father, just as Jesus offered Himself to the Father on the Cross. In an unbloody way, we repeat – make present – Christ's death and Resurrection. Through this memorial of Jesus, we offer God our praise, sorrow for our sins, and deepest thanks. The Mass is also a **meal**. At the Consecration, the bread and wine, through the power of the Holy Spirit, become the Body and Blood of Christ. Not a mere symbol, but Jesus's real flesh and real blood, under the appearance of bread and wine. When we receive Holy Communion, we receive Jesus Himself. He is real food for our soul. He said this very plainly: *I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. My flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him.* (John 6:55-56). What are the benefits of Holy Communion? It strengthens our union with Jesus; He lives within us in a special way. It cleanses us from venial sins. (Mortal sins require forgiveness in Confession.) It gives us grace to avoid sin in the future. It increases our love of God and neighbor.

6. Why do we have to worship with other people? God made us social beings. He wants us to come together in community to worship Him. Jesus said, "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I" (Matthew 18:20).

7. What are the consequences for others if we stop going to Mass? James Stenson points out: "Our ancestors risked persecution, even death, to be able to take part in Mass. When you have children someday, they will need the graces and strength that come from the Mass. If you fail to pass it on because of your own indifference, you will do the gravest injustice to them and to God. You have the power to snuff out, in one generation, the faith that has sustained your family for generations. This is an enormous responsibility. You will have to answer to God for it."

8. The benefits of Mass. If we give God a chance, He will help us experience the tremendous benefits of the Mass and the Eucharist. James Stenson writes: "Be patient. Bring an attitude of prayer and thanksgiving to Mass, and you will reap great spiritual riches: consolation, confidence, peace, deep happiness, and spiritual strength for the challenges of life." Mother Teresa went to Mass every day. If we love the Mass as she did, we, too, will live in Jesus and he in us, and will we never be afraid.


